THE UNIVERSITY OF NEW HAVEN

The University of New Haven is a private, coeducational university founded as a branch of Northeastern University in 1920. In 1926 it became an independent college and in 1970 it had added the graduate School and expanded its programs to become a University. The acquisition of the present campus in West Haven in 1960 promoted rapid expansion of facilities, faculty, and student body (the current enrollment includes 1,600 full-time undergraduates). The University offers excellent instruction in a great variety of academic disciplines, yet is small enough to accommodate individual programs and needs. Programs are constantly evolving to meet changing academic and career needs and the requirements of business, industry, and professional fields. The University's small class size fosters close student-faculty relationships. The University operates a branch in New London. Off-campus graduate courses are offered in New London, Newington, Waterbury, and Stamford. The main campus is located in West Haven on a hillside overlooking Long Island Sound, with a view of downtown New Haven. On the main campus are the main administration and classroom buildings; the School of Business; the School of Engineering; the School of Hospitality and Tourism; the Graduate School; five residence halls; the library; the bookstore; the student center; the Computer Center; the psychology building; the School of Arts and Sciences; the School of Public Safety and Professional Studies; and the Bayer Hall Admissions Building. The Charger Gymnasium and playing fields are on the North Campus, two blocks away.

Intercollegiate varsity programs are offered in baseball, basketball, cross-country, football, golf, lacrosse, soccer, softball, tennis, track, and volleyball. An extensive intramural program is also available for both men and women. Of the undergraduate day students, approximately 65 percent live on campus in the five residence halls. Over 30 University clubs and organizations are open to interested students. Included are student chapters of professional societies, religious organizations, social groups, special interest clubs, student councils, cultural groups, and fraternities and sororities.

The Graduate School offers master's degrees in aviation science; business administration; cellular and molecular biology; community psychology; computer science; criminal justice; education; electrical engineering; environmental engineering; environmental science; executive business administration; executive engineering management; fire science; forensic science; health-care administration; hospitality and tourism; human nutrition; industrial engineering; industrial hygiene; industrial/organizational psychology; labor relations; management of sports industries, mechanical engineering; occupational safety and health management; operations research; and public administration. Dual degrees are offered in business administration and public administration.

2002 OUTLOOK

On May 1, 2001 the University of New Haven women's lacrosse claimed its first win in the history of the program with a 16-4 win over Rhode Island College. As the squad enters it second year of existence, head coach de'Sha Foster has put together a team with experience and depth. The Chargers return the top two scorers from a year ago and bring in a crop of talented recruits who will contribute right away.

Sophomores Stephanie Napp and Jessica Clow tallied 16 and 14 points, respectively last season. Clow became the programs first ever team M.V.P., after amassing 12 goals and two assists for 14 points. Napp led the team with 16 points (13G, 3A), collected 47 ground balls and forced 22 turnovers. Sophomore Sandra O'Neil, who scored the programs first ever goal, returns, along with junior Brenda Diaz as each tallied three goals last season. Seniors Kelley Delaney and Erica Blais will wear the captain monikers this season, and teamed with senior Eva Chestnut and graduate student Amanda Shinn, add the experience which will propel the Chargers through the 2002 season.

Looking to add depth to the Chargers over next few years will be newcomers freshmen Lori Nachman, Eileen Perchinski, Casandra Schmidt and junior Allyson Skeens. Nachman, a member of the women's soccer team at New Haven, was a High School All-American, while Perchinski was an all-conference selection at Hicksville High School. Schmidt led New Milford High School to an undefeated regular season, while earning all-conference and all-state honors along the way. Skeens, the founder of the Ball State Women's Lacrosse Club, will play dual role for the Chargers this season adding skill and experience to both the attack and goalkeeper positions.

Coach Foster begins her second season at the helm of the women's lacrosse program at the University

Prior her arrival to New Haven, Foster was the defensive specialist and assistant coach at Connecticut College from 1997-2000. During her tenure the Camels appeared in the Eastern College Athletic Conference semifinals in 1998 and 1999 and captured the 2000 ECAC Championships.
