

2009 Season Preview

After compiling a program-best 14-3 record a season ago, the University of New Haven women's lacrosse team will look to continue its success in 2009. The team was nationally ranked for the first time in program history in 2008, moving up as high as #8 in the nation in the Intercollegiate Women's Lacrosse Coaches Association (IWLCA)/Under Armour Division II National Poll. This season, the Chargers will begin the season ranked in two national polls: #9

in the Lacrosse Magazine poll and #8 in the IWLCA poll.

Head Coach Jen Fallon will look to guide New Haven to its first NCAA postseason appearance in program history in her third season at UNH. Fallon tied the Chargers single-season record for wins in her first season when UNH finished with a 7-10 record and followed that up by doubling the team's win total in 2008. The former All-American looks for the team to continue to improve and not

simply assume last season's success will carry over to this year.

"We are all very aware that this is a different year," Fallon said. "It's a different team with different challenges ahead of us."

Joining Fallon on the bench this season will be fourth-year assistant coach **Beth Hemminger** and first-year graduate assistant coach **Kristin Link**.

The Chargers will begin its first season in the Northeast-10 Conference after competing in the East Coast Conference (ECC) for the last two years, but their schedule remains relatively unchanged. UNH plays its inaugural Northeast-10 game on Friday, March 13 when they take on Merrimack College. In addition to its challenging Northeast-10 schedule, New Haven will play two teams outside of the conference who also rank in the IWLCA top 10 preseason poll. The Chargers take on #3 Adelphi University on Friday, April 3 and #2 C.W. Post on Wednesday, April 8. New Haven takes on conference-foe Stonehill College, ranked #5 in the preseason poll, on Wednesday, April 15.

One difference for UNH this season will be the opportunity for postseason play. In the ECC, the only opportunity to play in the postseason was in the NCAA tournament; however, the Chargers will have the chance to participate in the Northeast-10 Conference Championship if they finish as one of the top six teams in the conference.

The Chargers will look to their five seniors for leadership this season. "I know what a talented group of seniors we have and recognize how invaluable their experience is," Fallon said.

Seniors **Brigid Brady** and **Mallory Ferrandiz** have spent most of their three years at UNH rewriting the women's lacrosse record books. Brady, who was the first IWLCA All-American in program history a season ago, currently holds the record for total points in both a season (67) and a career (189) and goals in both a season (58) and a career (167). Her teammate Ferrandiz ranks first in career assists (39) and is second in career goals (104) and points (143). She also has the second most assists in a season (19) and ranks fourth in both single-season goals (49) and points (63). Last season, both earned ECC First Team All-Conference honors and IWLCA All-Regional honors.

Coach Fallon has high praise for both standout seniors. "Brigid is a pure attacker. She has an incredible ability to finish a scoring play," Fallon said. "Mallory is without question the most selfless player I have ever coached. She is the player that everyone looks to when we need something to happen."

The Chargers will also count on seniors Brianna Kenworthy, Ashley Griffin and Stacey Krasnoff for leadership on and off the field. Kenworthy finished with 23 goals and eight assists last season, while Griffin and Krasnoff have been staples on

defense for New Haven for the past three years.

"The strengths of this team start with our experience," Fallon said. "We have strong senior leaders who are really good at convincing others to buy in."

New Haven returns four juniors who all had big impacts in 2008. Kristine Lambracht scored 29 goals a season ago and was named to the ESPN the Magazine College Division Second Team Academic All-District, while teammate Sarah LeGoff scored 28 goals and handed out five assists her sophomore campaign. Maryellen Shea started all 17 games on defense for UNH last season, and goalkeeper Shannon Greenwood compiled a 7-2 record with a .449 save percentage. The junior class played a large role in the team's emergence last season and will need to again for the Chargers to continue to succeed.

Sophomore **Ashley Ferrandiz**, sister of senior Mallory Ferrandiz, leads the sophomore class after a memorable freshman season. She totaled the most points (64) of any freshman in program history, a mark that is also good for third in single-season history. Ferrandiz also ranks third all time in single season assists (16) and fifth all time in single season goals (48).

"Ashley makes things happen on both ends of the field," Fallon said. "She is an exciting player to watch."

Joining Ferrandiz on offense are returning sophomores Carolina Marrero and Lisa Barnard. Marrero started all 17 games last season and finished with 16 goals, while Barnard appeared in eight games and tallied three goals. Redshirt sophomore Stephanie Usseglio also returns on offense for UNH after sitting out last season.

New Haven welcomes sophomore transfer Missy Carney and has added depth at each position with its freshman class. Joining the offense will be Sarah Magnone, Laura McLean and Alexis Gabbe, while Aubrey Duncan will help patrol the midfield. Maureen Verdillo will see time on defense for UNH, and Maureen Spellman will challenge for the starting spot at goalkeeper.

"The freshmen are not only going to be a big part of this team, but they will be a big part of the continued growth of the program," Fallon said. "They are all athletic and ready to contribute."

UNH has high expectations for this season and has the pieces in place to fulfill those expectations. The team is ready to prove itself once again and challenge for a Northeast-10 Conference title.

"It has become not just wanting to win," Fallon said. "It's expecting to win."



Jen Fallon enters her third season as the head coach of the women's lacrosse team at the University of New Haven in the spring of 2009. Fallon guided the Chargers to a 14-3 record in 2008 and was named both the *Inside Lacrosse* Division II Coach of the Year and the East Coast Conference Coach of the Year in just her second season.





Most recently, Fallon was the head girl's lacrosse coach and physical education teacher at Greens Farms Academy in Westport, Conn., with additional duties in the areas of policy & curriculum and athletic game management.

"Jen brings a wealth of high-level lacrosse experience to New Haven," said UNH Athletic Director Deborah Chin at the time of Fallon's appointment. "She earned All-America honors at the Division II level and knows what it takes to succeed on and off the field. We are excited that Coach Fallon is joining the Charger family."

As a collegiate lacrosse player, Fallon was a three-time Division II All-America selection (1994-96) and is Sacred Heart's all-time scoring leader with 264 career points. She scored 212 career goals with 52 assists, and in her All-American seasons posted three of the school's top four single-season point totals. She is 20th on the D-II national career scoring list, and is ninth all-time in goals scored.

"I'm excited for the opportunity to be a part of this program and the University of New Haven," Fallon said. "I look forward to continuing the progress that this team has already made. One of my goals is to keep the UNH women's lacrosse program moving toward being one of the top ten teams in Division II."

A native of Milford, Conn., Fallon earned her bachelor's degree in psychology from Sacred Heart in 1996. She is a member of the U.S. Lacrosse Association, the CGSCA and NSCAA, and is CPR and AED certified. She resides in Fairfield, Conn.



BETH HEMMINGER

Beth Hemminger starts her fourth year with the University of New Haven's women's lacrosse team after joining the staff in 2005. She earned All-American honors three times for the Wooster lacrosse team. In 2003, she was NCAC offensive player of the year and she is still the leading point scorer in both NCAC and Wooster's school history.

Beth served as an assistant lacrosse coach for her alma mater in 2004, helping them to a first place conference finish. Beth was also a four-year starter for Wooster's soccer team and earned All-Conference and All-Region accolades from 2001-2003.





The Northeast-10 can look to a long history of successes - the growth from seven original schools to more than double its size 20 years later - the contention for and winning of national championships - the change in league structure from on-campus administration to a central governing location - the anticipation of, coping with and addition of modern technology - the recognition of student-athlete performances in the classroom where the real competitions are played out - all of them have been built thanks to the hard work and dedication through the years of thousands of people who have, at one time or another, called the Northeast-10 home for their athletics program or their livelihood.

The NE-10 history began with the vision of a few good men and women. It was back in 1979 that a handful of athletics directors realized that the world of college athletics was changing and that they, and their programs, would have to change as well.

In the late 1970's and early 1980's the NCAA began to emphasize the importance of conferences in organizing competition and determining bids to NCAA national tournaments. The NCAA required six teams to be recognized as a conference in order to award championships, and the creation of national tournaments with automatic qualifiers to league champions became a new goal towards which teams could strive.

The founding fathers of the NE-10 were only happy to comply. Thus, a handful of athletic directors at smaller schools, classified Division II and of similar scope, academic makeup and athletic abilities hatched the idea of a new athletics conference in New England. Therefore, on October 9, 1979, a simple press release announced that a new unnamed Division II conference was being formed. Eight months later, at the Pleasant Valley Country Club in Springfield, Mass., the league was publicly announced.

The Northeast-7 Conference established instant credibility in its membership and that credibility led to a slow but continued expansion through the years. The admittance of Saint Anselm in 1981 created the Northeast-8. In 1984, Hartford joined the ECAC Division I North Atlantic Conference but was immediately replaced by Merrimack.

The "Northeast-10" name came about when Saint Michael's and Quinnipiac joined the league in 1987 and the conference remained stable until 1995 when Springfield left for Division III. The league stayed at 10 members as Le Moyne joined the league in 1996 from the New England Collegiate Conference (NECC) and briefly expanded to 11 when Pace joined in 1998 from the New York Collegiate Athletic Conference (NYCAC). Quinnipiac elevated to the Division I Northeast Conference (NEC) to again return the foundation of 10 until the last major expansion took place prior to 2001 when five new schools joined the fold. Franklin Pierce, Southern New Hampshire University (formerly New Hampshire College), the University of Massachusetts Lowell and Southern Connecticut State University were joined by the College of Saint Rose.

In 2008, Bryant University left for Division I, and University of New Haven was added to replace them immediately in all sports. Adelphi University will join the conference in 2009-10, bringing membership to 16 full-time institutions.





UNIVERSITY ADMINISTRATION





Steven H. Kaplan, Ph.D. President, University of New Haven

Steven Kaplan, Ph.D., became the 6th president of the University of New Haven on July 1, 2004. Dr. Kaplan joined a then nearly 85-year-old institution dedicated to real-life learning and career-focused higher education. With enrollment of 4500 undergraduate and graduate students representing more

than 25 states and some 70 countries, UNH has several nationally ranked programs in a number of majors in business, engineering, public safety, and the liberal arts and sciences.

Dr. Kaplan was presented to the community in March 2004 by then-Board of Governors Chairman Robert Alvine, who characterized the then presidentdesignate as energetic, well-liked and respected, focused and remarkably effective in mobilizing an institution's resources to achieve target results. His highest priorities for early action are strengthening the university's endowment, growing enrollment to optimum levels, and engendering an atmosphere for excellence among all constituencies. In the first months of his presidency he focused on establishing strong relationships with members and organizations within UNH's circle of constituents - faculty, students, administrators, alumni, friends, campus neighbors and leaders of Connecticut's business and public service communities. Within weeks of his arrival in Connecticut, an anonymous donor made a \$500,000 cash gift signifying his delight in the University's new leadership

As president, he oversees a faculty of nearly 400 persons, 530 staff personnel and an annual budget of \$65 million.

Previously, Dr. Kaplan was chancellor and professor of English at the University of Virginia's College at Wise, Virginia, the only four-year branch campus of the University of Virginia and one of the nation's best public colleges, according to *U. S. News & World Report.*

Dr. Kaplan began his teaching career in 1982 as an Instructor of English at the University of Maryland, European Division. From 1985-1989, he served as Visiting Lecturer in American Studies at Eberhard-Karls Universität, Tübingen, Germany – one of the oldest and most highly regarded universities in Europe. After completing his doctoral studies at Eberhard-Karls Universität, he returned to the U.S. to teach English at the University of Southern Colorado. Within three years, he was made department chair, serving in that capacity for two years before becoming director of the Center for International Studies.

Dr. Kaplan also served as dean of Arts and Humanities at SUNY College at Buffalo, an institution with about 11,000 students; and as Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and acting provost at Butler University, an independent comprehensive institution of five colleges and 3,400 students, which is ranked by *U. S. News & World Report* as one of the top ten regional universities in the Midwest.

He completed his Ph.D. in Comparative Literature at Eberhard-Karls Universität in Germany and holds the Master of Arts degree (with a concentration

in philosophy, German, and English), also from Eberhard-Karls Universitat. He earned his Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of California at Los Angeles.

Dr. Kaplan is the author of a book on American translations of the poetry of Rainer Maria Rilke, a number of scholarly essays, a book on Tim O'Brien's fiction with the University of South Carolina Press, and an anthology of international war stories with the University Press of Colorado.

Dr. Kaplan and his wife, Anemone Schweizer-Kaplan, are both ardent opera buffs and love to ballroom dance, hike, and downhill ski. They share a great love for the visual and performing arts and have traveled to over twenty-five countries in twenty-five years, including Tanzania where they hiked up Mt. Kilimanjaro. They have a son and three daughters.

Dr. Kaplan grew up in Chicago, the son of a shoe store owner and an actress-comedienne. His father, he said, taught him to love ideas and appreciate the contributions we all need to make to good causes. He was a good friend of Oskar Schindler, was instrumental in getting the story out in book and film form (associate producer of the film), and is the President of the Oskar Schindler Humanitarian Foundation. Dr. Kaplan also serves on the board of the foundation.

His wife grew up in Southwest Germany. She holds the equivalent of an American M.A. in Secondary Education and taught at a German high school. She is a ceramics artist and taught German and pottery during their time in Wise.



Deborah Chin, Director of Athletics, University of New Haven

Deborah Chin became the school's fourth director of athletics in 1993, and currently oversees a department which sponsors 17 NCAA Division II varsity sports. She was elected to the prestigious position of Chair for the NCAA's Division II Management Council for 2008.

UNH Athletics has enjoyed a high level of success across the board during Chin's tenure as Director of Athletics, advancing to NCAA tournament play 50 times in 14-plus years. UNH has recently made a number of capital improvements to athletic and recreational facilities, including the construction of the multi-million dollar David A. Beckerman Student Recreation Center, as well as a \$1.3 million synthetic turf renovation of Kayo Field (soccer and lacrosse). Chin spearheaded efforts to re-instate football as a varsity program and find UNH a new athletics conference that best fits the institution's long-term academic and athletic aspirations. Both goals were accomplished when UNH announced on November 13, 2007 that it had been accepted as a full member of the prestigious Northeast-10 Conference, effective the 2008-09 academic year. The Charger football team will return to the gridiron for the 2009 season.

A member of the University of New Haven staff

since 1975, Chin began her UNH career as Coordinator of Women's Athletics. She was responsible for starting the women's intercollegiate athletic program at UNH, coaching volleyball, tennis, basketball and softball in the early years. Chin eventually surrendered all head coaching responsibilities, except volleyball, when she was promoted to Associate Director of Athletics in 1979

Among her numerous honors, in 2007 the Connecticut Sportswriters' Alliance presented Chin with the Gold Key Award, the state's top sporting honor which recognizes significant contributions to athletics in the State of Connecticut. Chin won the NACDA/Continental Airlines Athletic Director of the Year for the Northeast Region in 1998-99 and was awarded the NACWAA Josten's District I Administrator of the Year Award in 1997. Chin won the National Association for Girls and Women in Sports Presidential Award in March 1997 and was the Connecticut Post Woman of the Year in 1993. Chin has also earned the U.S. Volleyball Association Meritorious Service Award and the YMCA Women in Leadership Award.

As head women's volleyball coach, Chin fashioned a Hall of Fame resume - literally - earning induction into the American Volleyball Coaches Association (AVCA) Hall of Fame in December, 2006. Chin is also a member of the Connecticut Volleyball Hall of Fame (Inducted October, 1998), the Connecticut Women's Basketball Hall of Fame (April, 1999), and the Athletics Hall of Fame at her alma mater, SUNY-Cortland.

In an 18-year career (1975-93) as head coach for the Chargers, she posted a 578-179 record (.764) and was at that time only the fifth Division II coach to win 500 career matches. The Chargers made 10 trips to the NCAA tournament during Chin's reign, reaching the top five four times. Her awards include six AVCA Northeast Region Coach of the Year distinctions as well as eight New England Collegiate Conference Coach of the Year honors. Chin coached the Chargers to twelve 30-win seasons, including six straight. She is also recognized internationally as a top volleyball clinician.

As an administrator, Chin has served on over 30 national and regional committees. In addition to her current position as Chair of the Division II Management Council, her resume includes terms as chairperson for the NCAA Division II Volleyball Committee (1988-92), the NCAA Division II Baseball Committee (1997-2001), the NCAA Northeast Regional Football Committee (1999-2003), and the NACDA John McLendon Minority Scholarship Committee (1999-present). She served four years on the NACWAA Board of Directors (1993-96), and acted as the Volleyball Commissioner for the 1995 Special Olympics World Games held in New Haven.

A graduate of SUNY-Cortland with a Bachelor's of science in physical education, Chin earned her Master's of science degree in physical education from UNC-Greensboro.

UNH's intercollegiate program provides opportunities for its student-athletes to develop moral virtues, such as courage, self-confidence, and integrity and to learn communication and teamwork skills associated with outstanding leadership. Thus the Department of Athletics helps the University satisfy its primary aspiration, which is to prepare students to lead purposeful and fulfilling lives in a global society through experiential, collaborative, and discovery-based learning.


The Department of Athletics is committed to delivering intercollegiate athletics programs that are consistent with the University's mission and generates the trust and support of its various constituencies. The goal of the department is to field sports teams that compete successfully against other NCAA Division II teams while upholding the academic standards of the University of New Haven. The department is also committed to conducting its programs in strict adherence to the policies, rules and regulations set by the University's administration, Board of Governors, the NCAA and the Northeast-10 Conference.

Through its programs, the department gives its student-athletes of different genders, races, religions, national origins and sexual orientation opportunities to participate in intercollegiate competition. The intercollegiate program will function free of discrimination with a University commitment to the adherence to Title IX and the Office of Civil Rights guidelines. A major goal of the Department of Athletics is to help student-athletes realize the full potential of their athletic abilities while also increasing their intellectual capabilities and providing them a meaningful opportunity to earn a baccalaureate degree. The department will not compromise its commitment to educate and graduate its student-athletes.

Department of Athletics personnel are expected to represent the University in a manner consistent with UNH's principles and values. All personnel are expected to perform their responsibilities with the highest standards of integrity, ethical behavior and sportsmanship at all times. Coaches and staff are expected to treat student-athletes fairly and with respect and to facilitate leadership that helps them mature physically, intellectually, emotionally and socially.

Athletic Highlights

- The UNH women's volleyball team has reached the NCAA Sweet 16 seventeen times since 1983, and advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight eleven times.
- Baseball has consistently been ranked as one of the winningest Division II programs in NCAA history. Baseball Coach Emeritus Frank "Porky" Vieira retired after the 2006 season as Division II's all-time winningest coach by percentage, and logged 1,127 career victories. The team has appeared in 17 College World Series and made 31 Regional appearances.
- Baseball has also produced nine major league players, including former Cy Young winner Steve Bedrosian of the Philadelphia Phillies.
- Women's Basketball won the NCAA Division II National Championship in 1987.
- The football program appeared in four NCAA championship playoffs, earning runner-up status in 1997. That title-game appearance made UNH the only football team in the State of Connecticut to ever compete for a national title and the smallest school (in terms of enrollment) to compete for an NCAA Championship.
- Tailback Roger Graham won the 1993 Harlon Hill Trophy as the top Division II Football Player in the nation.
- Men's Soccer reached the NCAA finals in 1976 and finished third in 1977.
